Hockinson shifts gears to run past Columbia River

HOCKINSON — The Columbia River Rapids probably left Hockinson on Friday night wondering what team they just played.

It certainly wasn't the Hockinson Hawks they had seen on film.

Hockinson, which averaged 31 pass attempts and 37 rushing yards in its first five games, threw just 10 passes on Friday and rushed for 193 yards in a dominant 28-7 win in a 2A Greater St. Helens League game.
