he simplest of questions Manny Melo asked brought out the swiftest of answers.

Is Kaden Perry, Battle Ground High's 6-foot-9 junior who is committed to Gonzaga for the recruiting class of 2021, the most sought-after, highly-touted boys basketball player to come out of Southwest Washington?

Future NBA players Dan Dickau (Prairie High) and Richie Frahm (Battle Ground) played at Gonzaga. So did Mountain View's Derek Raivio. Most recently, Robert Franks (Evergreen), out of Washington State, got signed by the Charlotte Hornets and plays in the NBA G League.

At 16 years old, and in this new age of recruiting, Perry might already be. Melo, Battle Ground's third-year head coach, got his answer from his own staff. Gregg Kalian, a longtime Clark County basketball coach, one-time Battle Ground head coach, and around Clark County basketball since playing for Battle Ground in the 1970s, told him yes.

"It's crazy the amount of eyes that have been on (Perry) the last three years," Melo said.

Melo estimated he fielded calls from 20 college programs, and constantly had coaches sit in on practices and workouts.

What's not to like about Perry? In a growing time of positionless basketball, Perry is a traditional big man rooted in the basics of playing center and power forward. Yet his size, skill and athleticism allows him to dominate beyond the paint on both ends of the floor and stretch the defenses out with a blossoming mid-range and perimeter game. He's drawn comparisons to former Zags now in the NBA, most notably, Brandon Clarke, a first-round draft pick by Memphis in June's NBA Draft.

"He does stuff no other kid in this area does," Melo said. "The stuff almost looks so crazy that it can't be real."

A nightmare matchup

Last season, when Battle Ground reached the state

tournament for the first time since 2002, Perry averaged 16 points, 10 rebounds and four blocks per game. In its state-game loss to Kentridge in the Tacoma Dome, Perry scored 20 points, grabbed 17 rebounds and blocked seven shots.

Most game nights, the Tigers have a tactical advantage on every team by having their tallest player playing 12 feet and in from the basket, where Perry is the strongest.

"That's the challenge for the coaches in this league," Gruhler said. "A player like that, you have to gameplan for offensively and defensively, is pretty special."

Perry's already off to a big start. In Battle Ground's season opener this month, he posted 29 points, 26 rebounds and five blocks.

But Perry continues works on broadening his versatility. He understands the shift at his game's position, but also knows what's

best for the Tigers. The junior doesn't face many opponents that can measure up to his size and skill level down low; BG's offense is generated a lot through Perry, and less of a pace-and-space offenses that take over today's positionless basketball. There's still great value having a polished, traditional big-man skill set,

and Perry appreciates his rooted style of

play in the paint.

"I feel like everyone is trying to be that point guard or that wing that shoots the lights out for outside," he said. "It's nice that I'm a big, strong dude in the middle of the key. I like that."

Gruhler points to analytics as to why Perry makes the traditional, low-post game goes against a dying trend: effectiveness.

"He breaks those mathematics," Gruhler said. "He makes the mathematics not look so good because the post-up isn't efficient if you're only scoring the ball 50 percent of the time, but it is efficient if you're shooting at the rim and scoring 80 percent of the time."

In two years, Perry's turned from tall, lengthy ninth grader, into a force on both ends of the floor with as much upside to

While his game continues to evolve, maturity came first.

A mother's helper

Melo returned to coach his alma mater at the same time Perry entered high school. He put one freshman on the varsity roster in 2017-18.

> That season came with adjustments in basketball and away from it for

Perry. In the midst of the season, Perry's mother, DeLena, was hospitalized and diagnosed with Guillain-Barre Syndrome, a condition in which the immune system attacks the nerves.

Perry describes his relationship with his mother, a single mom, as very close. DeLena Perry is still recovering and has daily caregiving, but her eldest son assists with mom's needs at every opportunity, he said.

This experience changed him for the better, too.

"The person whose cared for me all my life," Perry said, "I'm needing to help her and she needs me. It's made me step up to the plate, and realize how I need to pick up stuff and mature more for her sake. I'm still trying to find that balance."

That also goes with basketball.

Over a four-week stretch this fall, Perry took his official Gonzaga visit and played in USA Basketball's Junior National Team's minicamp in Colorado Springs, Colo. It's a threeday, invite-only event showcasing 80 elite-level high school recruits and prospects nationwide.

Perry, accompanied by Melo, took more away from that camp than he ever imagined. Patience is one of them.

"The competition there is unbelievable," he said. "Seeing that high-level of basketball can change the way you look at things.

"Going there to have guys match or even surpass my ability, I learned I can't big-body them."

Better each season

By age 13, Perry stood 6-5 and played in the high school's summer league program. His parents never wanted their oldest son's size to go to waste. Younger brother, Kyren, is a freshman at Prairie.

Longtime friend and teammate Brendan Beall is Battle Ground's secondleading scorer returning off last year's 18-10 team that reached the Tacoma Dome.

Beall said Perry's work ethic goes unmatched. While that's never changed, his game has.

"From season to season, he just grows and becomes a better player," said Beall, a senior guard. "You know he could be something, but it was a matter of him wanting to be good at basketball. I knew Kaden would want to put the time in; he's a hard worker like that."

That work ethic, motor and fundamentals are aspects of Perry' game that Melo, BG's head coach, had Gonzaga coaches high on the teen.

Perry has always called Gonzaga his dream school. Perry said Gonzaga's track record of developing big men, including many who have made the NBA, is a sticking point.

"I love how they develop their guys," he said.

Gonzaga had been in contact with Perry prior to the scholarship offer, so it didn't come out of the blue. But a talk with head coach Mark Few and assistant coaches Brian Michaelson and Tommy Lloyd following Battle Ground's team camp in June came as a surprise by Perry.

He committed on the spot.

"It was the first time I ever thought I was going to pass out," he said of the offer.

By verbally committing, Perry became the Zags' first verbal commit for the class of 2021 in a class statewide that features Olympia's Jackson Grant (UW commit) and O'Dea's Paolo Banchero, a five-star recruit considered one of the nation's top prospects.

Leaving a legacy

If a future in basketball doesn't pan out, Perry has a back-up plan.

"If I can't be an NBA player," he said, "then I'm going to be a singer. I sing all the time."

Perry isn't fazed by

crowds of students' stares in the Battle Ground hallways by his stature or vocal chords.

Neither does drawing a crowd of defenders every game.

Perry walks the same Battle Ground hallways as ex-Tigers Mike Brotherton, the state player of the year on BG's 1990 state title team, and Frahm, who played at Gonzaga from 1996-00.

He also knows the storied past of John McKnight, the Greater St. Helens League's all-time leading scorer.

McKnight, a 6-2 guard, scored 1,572 career points in three seasons at Battle Ground from 1969-72 during a time when freshmen didn't play varsity, and the 3-point line was 16 years away from being adopted in the high school game. After graduation, McKnight



played at Washington.

Perry knows his legacy is far from over, but he wants it to begin by adding to the boys basketball banner of team accomplishments that hangs in the gymnasium. "Hopefully, we can put something up there," he said.

"That's the dream."

Union sets sights on ninth straight league title

There's a certain expectation to be had in a program that's won eight consecutive 4A Greater St. Helens League titles.

For the Union Titans, they've seen what it takes to be a league champion.

"Because of that," coach Blake Conley said, "they know the blueprint to follow in terms of chemistry and buy into what we're trying to do. It's harder when you haven't had success sometimes because if the kids are humble enough to learn from the groups before them, they have the blueprint. They look at it with that mindset not that we have to keep the streak alive, but they look at it what did the group before us do and let's build on that."

And the blueprint for Union is pretty hefty if the Titans are going to win their ninth league title — either shared or

outright — in a row. Three players with starting experience — Brad Lackey, Tanner Toolson, and Josh Reznick — are back off a Titans team that reached the Tacoma Dome.

The top three 4A GSHL teams advance to the bi-district

Skyview and Battle Ground, both playoff teams a season ago, each return three starters. The Storm, which shared the league title with Union two seasons ago when it last reached the 4A state tournament, is powered by allleaguer Kyle Gruhler. Battle Ground is poised for another playoff run behind the size of 6-foot-9 Gonzaga commit Kaden Perry and guard Brendan Beall. Last season's run to the Tacoma Dome was the Tigers' first since 2002.

Camas has a wealth of championship experience on its roster — Jackson Clemmer, Blake Asciutto — from its 4A title-winning football team. Heritage looks to gain more ground under second-year coach Brian Childs.

Talent, parity highlight this year's league

Is this the deepest the 4A Greater St. Helens League has been in recent memory? With a stacked top four, it certainly feels like it.

Union and Camas return some key pieces from a shared title a season ago; Skyview is again healthy after starting last season 11-0; and Heritage has possibly the most talented girls basketball player in Clark County.

"It's going to be a really special year for girls hoops down here," Camas coach Scott Thompson said.

Union, after finishing 17-6 last season, brings back Mason Oberg from a knee injury. She joins a loaded backcourt with all-league picks Mackenzie Lewis and Lolo Weatherspoon.

Camas' Faith Bergstrom is a must-see post player. Combined with Jalena Carlisle and Katelynn Forner, the Papermakers have a shot at returning to regionals for the fourth straight year.

Skyview's starting five impressed in the lead-up to the season and with Kazz Parks healthy again, the Storm could contend for a league title.

"I truly believe we have three teams who are legit top 20, if not top 15, in the state," Thompson said. "If we have some timely wins and don't play elimination games against each other, all three could make it to the dome."

Katie Peneueta is fresh off a gold medal in the Pacific Games and bolsters a young Heritage team that finished 6-13 last season.

Battle Ground, which finished 5-15 last season, will try to regain its toughness under coach Dave McIntosh.

Last season marked Battle Ground's first 4A state appearance in 18 sea-

sons. The Tigers hope to be the first to reach state in back-to-back seasons since 1991-'92

player of the year Haley Hanson and her 13 points per game are gone, Bergstrom is expected to take on a bigger scoring load this season and fellow post Ashley Bauer, a sophomore, is poised for a breakout season.


"They've taken that upon themselves to take what they have together and try to bring the other guys on board," Coach Childs said.




"Defensively, they're going to spearhead us and get us going," Brooks said.

For the first time in 18 seasons, the 2A Greater St. Helens League did not feature Mark Morris at the top. Columbia River, instead, was perfect in league play to dethrone the Monarchs a season ago and are now the sole defenders of the league title.

The Chieftains return as the favorites, but this time it won't be as easy.






(6-4) returns for his sophomore season and 6-4 forward Jonny Boissonault returns after a year away from the school.

Union girls enter season with title, respect

For Nevaeh Cassidy, the change in the Union wrestling room was subtle but noticeable.

To be clear, the girls on the Titans team had always felt welcomed by their male counterparts.

But after earning the first team state championship in Union wrestling history, Cassidy and her teammates felt a new level of respect.

It's the kind of respect that has nothing to do with gender. It's the type that is only earned by rising to excellence among your

"We've definitely had to earn our place," Cassidy said. "We're the first champions overall, so the boys have a lot of respect for us. But we've definitely had to earn that.'

Girls wrestling has grown rapidly since becoming a WIAA sanctioned sport.

At Mat Classic in 2007, the first girls tournament had 72 wrestlers across nine weight classes. This year's Mat Classic state championships will involve 224 athletes across 14 classes.

That has mirrored growth in girls wrestling nationally. According to USA Wrestling, the number of girls competing in high school has grown from 804 in 1994 to 16,562 in 2018. Fifteen states now sponsor girls championships.

There are currently 46 collegiate women's wrestling programs in the nation with another 14 to be added within the next two years.

Girls wrestling has been

vibrant in Southwest Washington with four individuals winning state titles last year. But no local girls team had won the state title, though Washougal, Kelso and the previous year's Union team had all placed second.

So when Riley Aamold was told Union would clinch the state title if she won her 125-pound third-place match, she got a surge of adrenaline.

"I went out there and just focused on doing it for the team," she said.

Aamold won that match by pin. It was part of a

stellar tournament for the Titans that saw two wrestlers win state titles, two finish third and one place sixth.

Now Cassidy, a senior, and Aamold, a junior, are aiming to keep Union among the state's elite girls programs.

That starts with supporting each of the 14 girls on Union's roster.

"On the first day this year, I told all the new girls that we're a family here," said Cassidy, who placed third in the state at 155 pounds. "We're going to take care of you like you're

my little sisters."

That support involves encouragement when a workout is tough or a task becomes intimidating.

It extends off the mat, as well. The team often attends school functions together. Many of Cassidy's teammates gathered at her house for "Friendsgiving" last month.

"We're going to stick together and have each other's backs," Cassidy said. "Being in a maledominated sport, it can be threatening. But that's what I'm trying to teach these girls. We're just as strong. We're just as good. And I'm going to be here to support you."

Camas gymnasts have big expectations

Two-time state champs have depth to go for third title

When Camas gymnastics won its first state team title in school history in 2018, it was cause for excitement.

When the Papermakers followed that up with a second consecutive state championship last February, it was cause for validation. Camas showed it belonged among the elite programs in the state.

Now as another loaded Camas teams prepares for the 2019-20 season, it is cause for something new expectation.

"I've had people come up to me and say 'You guys going to get the three-peat?' "Camas coach Carol Willson said. "It's like now we're expected to win. But I was looking at scores from around the state, and Woodinville scored like a 173. They are going to be right on us."

That has prompted Willson to find new ways to keep her crew of 40 gymnasts motivated to improve during the season.

"Before our first meet, I gave the girls a number I wanted to them to hit," Willson said. "Get that score, and they could get a day off from practice. Carol needs a day off, too. And they went out and got that number with plenty to spare."

And the Papermakers achieved their first goal with their top gymnasts watching from the sideline.

Junior Shea McGee, the

2019 4A all-around state champion, did not compete in Camas' first meet of the season while she dealt with a minor hand injury. But the Papermakers didn't miss a beat.

"That's where our strength is going to be this year — our depth," Willson said.

Camas returns four gymnasts who competed in the all-around final at state last year. In addition to McGee, Alyssa Shibata placed sixth at state, Peyton Cody tied for eighth and Lili Ford was 11th.

This season, McGee, Shibata and Ford are juniors; Cody is a sophomore.

Also, seniors Lizzy Wing

and Morgan MacIntyre return from last year's state champion team, in addition to sophomore Olivia Bane, who qualified for the state finals on the bars.

And the talent pool gets even deeper this year with the addition of freshman Emma Crawford and junior Katerina Baden, a high-level club gymnast competing for the high school team for the first time.

"I think with our success, we're finding more kids who want to come out and be part of the team," Willson said.

It provides the coach with an enviable problem, trying to find places in the lineup for all of those lineups. "We've got kids on our program who would be on varsity at other schools, and I'm just trying to find a spot to get them into a meet," Willson said.

Willson said she's seen the program grow from five gymnastics in her first year at Camas. And she's also noticed a growth in numbers in other programs around Clark County.

"I think you look at the teams we had at our first meet, and it's great to see so many kids out for gymnastics," Willson said. "I'd like to think our success had a little something to do with that. It's great for gymnastics in the area."

"I was trying to get the JV hyped," Sparano said. "There are a couple of

And Kim finds that joy in grinding out countless lengths of the pool during practices that start as early as 5 a.m.

"The key to everything is consistency," he said. "If you stay with it, progress will follow."



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
