## **PLACES TO GO**

When you gotta go, you gotta go! One challenge of nature hiking is finding a bathroom when you need it. These places offer a wonderful outdoor experience and also have bathrooms!

#### Salmon Creek Trail

A paved trail takes you through wetlands, around ponds, and across a natural habitat for plants and wildlife. You can access the Salmon Creek Trail from Salmon Creek Park.

#### **Battle Ground Lake**

A dirt trail takes you all the way around the lake with tall trees overhead and wildlife to see. It's a good place to hike and see nature, as well as a sandy beach for wading or swimming.

#### Lacamas Lake

This gravel trail is located on the west side of Lacamas Lake and Lacamas Creek provides opportunities to view birds, rock formations and waterfalls. It also has extensive waterfront access and playgrounds.

#### Burnt Bridge Trail Gnome Trail

This urban trail allows hikers of all experience levels to get outside without spending time and gas driving into the mountains. There is a small amount of parking and public bathrooms on the Fruit Valley Road trailhead. Watch for the signs to enter the forest trail of delightful gnomes waiting to greet you.

#### **Frenchman's Bar**

Frenchman's Bar Trail connects Vancouver Lake Park to Frenchman's Bar Regional Park. The wide, paved path is great for a nature walk. On clear days can see Mount Hood, Mount Adams and Mount St. Helens.

# TAKE YOUR FUR FAMILY!

Most dogs love getting out into nature too. Make sure they are up to date on their vaccinations before you bring them because they might meet other dogs on a hiking trail. Remember to bring bags to pick up after them. Also dogs get thirsty too! They shouldn't drink out of ponds, lakes, streams, or rivers. Bring their own water and a dog water bowl.

#### **HIKING DO'S AND DON'TS**

Stay with your person or group – Don't wander off alone Pick up your trash – Don't leave a mess Watch out for bicycles – Don't get in their way Save your snacks for yourself – Don't feed wildlife (it could make them sick) Keep your dog on a leash – Don't let them run loose



#### **ARE YOU CURIOUS?**

There are so many species of wildlife and plants around here. If you're curious to find out what they are—there's an app for that! Ask someone with a smart phone to get an app on their phone for identifying plant species and bird calls. It's a lot of fun! Also plant identification apps can help you avoid stinging nettles before you touch them.





# **Giant Island**





# Let's Grow SUNFLOWERS

Have you ever thought about growing your own plants outside? Sunflowers are a fun plant to grow. There are different kinds of sunflowers. Some are really tall and others are shorter. They are all a pretty yellow color

and produce seeds to make more sunflowers. People can eat sunflower seeds, and birds and squirrels like the seeds too. Bees and butterflies love the flowers.

## Where to plant your sunflowers

Sunflowers look great planted in the soil along a fence. A fence gives them something to lean on so they can stand up tall as they grow. Smaller sunflowers can be planted in pots filled with soil. All kinds of sunflowers need a lot of sun to grow. When you find the sunniest place for your sunflowers, you can see them turn their heads to follow



the sun. If your family is growing other plants outside, don't plant your sunflowers near potatoes or green beans because these plants don't grow well if they are too close to each other.

### When to plant your sunflowers

The best time to plant your sunflowers is when the ground gets warmer. The seeds don't like to be put in the ground when we still have cold mornings when the ground is covered in white frost. April rains feel cold to us but spring rain helps to warm and loosen the soil. This gives water and vitamins that seeds need to grow roots. The roots feed from the soil to grow baby plants.

### How to plant your sunflowers

Your sunflower seed packet will tell you how to plant your seeds. Seeds can't be just scattered on ground. The squirrels would love to eat them all! The seeds need to planted deeper in the soil but not too close together or they won't have enough space or nutrients to grow. The directions on the seed packet will tell you how deep and how far apart to plant your sunflower seeds.

## What happens next?

Watch for your baby sunflower plants to spring up through the soil. Don't worry if some are growing but others are not. Sometimes the squirrels eat them before the seeds can sprout. If this happens, you can plant another seed in that same place and watch for a sprout to come out of the ground. You can save some seeds and plant more every week or every two weeks, so you will have sunflowers growing all summer.

Remember you need to be patient when you plant the seeds. It takes a couple of months before they grow into pretty yellow sunflowers. Ask an older person for help to grow your sunflowers. It's a fun thing for people of all ages to work on together.
